Music Notes

Exodus, Suite for Organ was composed in 2006 by Sharon J. Willis. Dr. Willis is a prolific American composer, playwright, music educator, lecturer, and church musician. Known as an expert musical story teller she has composed over fifteen operatic works as well as choral, vocal, and organ compositions, both sacred and secular. The composer is also a lyric soprano and is often invited to present lecture-recitals on the "Spiritual as an Art Song" in which she traces the development of the African American spiritual and its important in classical solo repertoire. Dr. Willis also speaks regularly at colleges, universities, and churches about her compositions and her perspective as a woman composer and as an African American composer.

Dr. Willis describes "Exodus" in the following paragraphs:

This organ suite was written as a memorial tribute to the legendary Harriet Tubman who was born a slave around 1820 in the Brodas Plantation in Tidewater, Maryland. She escaped by way of the Underground Railroad to Philadelphia in 1849. In 1851, after working as a cook and a nurse, she was able to return to Maryland and Virginia to rescue her family and other passengers from slavery. In her words: Ah nevuh lost a passenger an' Ah nevuh run my train off de track".

The title "Exodus" was taken from the second book of the Old Testament. A book recounting the story of

the Hebrews being led from the bondage of slavery out of Egypt to the land of Canaan by their spiritual leader, Moses. Harriet Tubman was dubbed the "Black Moses" of her people as she led passengers to freedom, never giving any thought to her own safety".

"Exodus" consists of three distinct movements each focusing on a different element of the journey to freedom and is filled with musical symbolism.

1) Chronicles: "Passacaglia"

The passacaglia is a Baroque musical form in which a theme is written in the bass line and repeated with harmonic variations in the upper parts. Chronicles attempts to record Tubman's repeated underground trips. The theme is presented nineteen times equal to what historians claim is the number of trips made by Tubman. Because she could never use the same route for fear of discovery, the passacaglia theme is always presented differently. Three spirituals, "Fare Ye Well", "Wad in the Water", and "Go Down Moses" are superimposed upon the theme. Near the end of the movement, block chords of "Go Down Moses" are clearly stated pushing to the state line and to freedom.

2) Communion a "Rite of Fellowship"

The Communion is a tender movement that reflects the shared experiences of the passengers as they endured the hardships of the journey and as they broke bread together. The two spirituals "Drinking of the Wine" and "Let Us Break Bread Together" capture the essence of this spiritual communion. 3) Celebration on a "Juba"

The final movement is a celebration of freedom and gratitude for a new life. A juba is a lively duplemetered dance characterized by playing syncopated rhythms against even rhythms and was performed often by African Americans. The juba theme in Celebration is based upon the spiritual "I Got a Robe"
