<u>Music Notes:</u> Ernest Bloch (1880-1959) is one of the leading composers in the canon, most well-known for his musical contributions in Jewish/Hebrew choral music. Born in Switzerland, Bloch held positions in the United States at the Mannes School of Music, San Francisco Conservatory, Cleveland Institute of Music, and UC Berkeley.

Bloch's *Avodath Hakodesh* (*Sacred Service*) is a 50-minute work for orchestra, SATB choir, and Baritone soloist (cantor) that is divided into five parts, mirroring the Sabbath morning liturgical progression in the Union Prayerbook. Parts are separated by orchestral preludes and interludes that represent periods of congregational silence (silent devotions) such as the removal of the Torah scrolls from the ark and their return. Bloch was - at the time of this work's inception - the only composer to ever set music to the Jewish Liturgy as composers had been doing with the Mass Ordinary for centuries.

"[This work] was conceived as a transcendent, even inclusive humanistic work of universal spiritual experience, at the same time attempting to serve the more particularistic function of specifically Jewish worship...Though intensely Jewish in its roots, this message seems to me above all a gift of Israel to the whole of mankind." - Ernest Bloch
