**Music Notes:** German composer Johann Pachelbel was best known for his works for organ and was considered to be one of the great organists of the generation before Johann Sebastian Bach. During his lifetime, he composed more than two hundred pieces for organ. His contributions to the development of the chorale prelude and fugue earned him a place among the most important composers of the middle Baroque era. Among his best known compositions is the Canon in D, and is one of the most widely performed pieces of Baroque music.
