MUSIC NOTES - HAPPY BIRTHDAY VIVALDI !

Antonio Vivaldi, Italian composer and violin virtuoso, was born March 4th, 1678 in Venice and was known primarily for his developments in orchestration and the concerto form. In addition to over 500 concertos for a variety of instruments, Vivaldi composed more than 60 sacred choral works, and over 50 operas.

His best-known work is a series of four violin concertos known as "The Four Seasons", each depicting a different season beginning with spring. The concertos were published with accompanying poems inserted directly into the music on the page thus relating the music to the poetic text and the spirit and sounds of each season. This use of a narrative component was one of the earliest examples of what was later to be called "program music".

The four concertos were composed in the eighteenth-century pattern of three movements: an Allegro (fast), a slow movement, and a final Allegro, shorter and livelier than the first. The organ music for this morning's service consists of the first and second movements from the "Spring" concerto and the second movement from the "Winter "concerto transcribed for keyboard.

Adult Education: Today through March 17 there are opportunities to intentionally draw closer to God using a variety of spiritual practices. Prayer stations are set up based on the Scripture for each week, with opportunities to reflect and respond with music in the Temple Room, art in the Art Room, labyrinths (body) in the Board Room, and written word in the Kehde Chapel. You are invited to use one room each week and encouraged to spend at least 30 minutes. You are welcome to return to Fellowship Hall if you would like to process your experience in a prayer station with others.
