Preparation for Worship: Trace the labyrinth.

- As you move inward: imagine you are walking away from Jerusalem away from Jesus' death and resurrection, away from your fellow disciples.
- At the center, imagine encountering the risen Christ.
- As you move outward, imagine you are walking back to Jerusalem.



#### What is a labyrinth?

A labyrinth is not a maze, there is only one path to the center with no "dead ends". It is an ancient figure and was used by Christian cathedrals in medieval Europe as a symbol of the journey of faith, and the journey of life. It was walked by those who could not afford the spiritual practice of going on a pilgrimage to the Holy Land. It was and is also used by Christians as a prayer tool, a way to focus the mind upon God and reflect upon God's presence in all the twists and turns of our journey. Labyrinths are designed for walking – and tracing them allows those with mobility issues to engage in the practice, as well as a way to bring the practice to everyday spaces.
