The Green Team will be leading worship as PCO celebrates its commitment to being an Earth Care Congregation. We are honored to have Dr. Gretel Van Wieren preaching and leading our Adult Education time.

Dr. Van Wieren is Professor of Religious Studies and Philosophy at Michigan State University where her research and teaching explore the spiritual and moral dimensions of people's relationships to land. Her courses and research focus on the intersection of religion, ethics, and the environment.

Professor Van Wieren grew up on west Michigan's lakeshore and is an ordained minister in the Reformed Church in America, where she has worked on environmental issues for over twenty years. She received her M.Div. and Ph.D. from Yale University.

Her sermon will be based on Isaiah 55:12: "All the trees of the field shall clap their hands." At the 11:30 am Adult Education hour she will discuss Nature, Spirituality and the Interconnectedness of All Beings: Practicing Kinship with Creation. There will be opportunities for group dialogue and discussion.

Your ISP may discard the forwarded message.

Update from Simbolei Academy

Otherwise, these families would need to rely on the bus to get them to and from their medical services. Taking a sick child to a bus stop and waiting is difficult In cold or rainy weather. Refugee families utilize this transportation help as well. Driving schedules vary and are flexible.

Public Policy Report—Ellen Hoekstra

While our attention may have been focused on national news, public policy continues to move ahead at the state level, including:

- A ballot proposal to restore "good time" to prisoners for good behavior during their incarceration is highly unlikely to make the November ballot. Its supporters have only 15,700 signatures and 356,958 are required.
- The Board of Canvassers has approved another ballot proposal, this one to shift permitting authority for large scale wind and solar projects back to local government from the state. Proponents state that if they cannot make the 356,958 signature threshold in time for the November election, they will try for a subsequent election.
- PA 233, which created the shift in permitting to the state mentioned above, faces challenges in drafting the regulation needed to implement it by November 29.
- The Michigan Department of Health and Human Services (MDHHS) will use a \$825,000 federal grant to expand local treatment options for youth involved in or at risk of being involved in the juvenile justice system. The focus is on prevention and intervention to reduce Michigan's current level of congregate care centers.
- MDHHS is investing \$10 million from opioid settlement funds in programs that focus on addressing racial disparities in healthcare. Despite recent overall decreases in Michigan's overdoses, Black residents are overdosing at a 2.7 times greater rate than white residents—based on preliminary January through June 2023 data.
- Legislation to prohibit open carry of firearms near polling places and drop boxes is unlikely to be finalized until after the upcoming special elections fill two open House seats. The bills, HB 4127-4128, were introduced by Rep. Penelope Tsernoglou of East Lansing and would create a 100 foot "open carry" ban near these sites.
- For the first time since the pandemic, college enrollment has increased but comes disproportionately from graduates in the state's wealthiest communities.
- The Michigan Senate, with bi-partisan support, passed legislation sponsored by Senator Sarah Anthony (Lansing) to cap payday loans at 36%, putting Michigan in line with 20 other states. Under current law, borrowers lent \$100 for two weeks would have to repay \$115 (391%), but under this bill, borrowers would be required to repay \$101.40.
- The Governor has appointed Jennifer DeLaCruz as the first director of the newly created Office of Community Violence Intervention Services. Late in 2023, \$7 million in violence intervention grants was awarded to community led organizations, including the Michigan Public Health Institute for an existing gun violence intervention program in Lansing. This program is called Advance Peace and focuses on reducing cyclical and retaliatory gun violence and plans to expand within Lansing and to East Lansing.

Diamond Jubilee Collection of Memories

To add to the Diamond Jubilee celebration of our church, I would like to encourage you to recall memories and share stories of your lives, experiences, and contributions associated with the Presbyterian Church of Okemos. Memories and material from the last decade, 2014-2024, added to those from the Jubilee (50th) celebration, would be most valuable.

How did the pandemic affect you? What difference did changes in technology (streaming, Zoom, and hybrid presentations), masking, social distancing, interfaith discussions, or new pastors make? How did you renew or replenish life since 2020?

Here are additional questions to stir memories from all 60 years. When and why did you come to PCO? What is your first memory of PCO? What did you expect when you came here? What did you find? Why did you stay? or leave? or both?

What are your favorite memories of your time at PCO?

What are your memories of the pastors, choir directors, organists, directors of Christian education, Sunday School teachers, other leaders, fellow pilgrims, friends, youth, or children at PCO? What have been your most significant activities, programs, encounters, or experiences associated with our church?

What has been your favorite place in the church? Why? What memories of, or associations with, other places (Okemos, Family Camp, mission trips, Presbytery, General Assembly, different faith communities) do you have?

What have been the memorable sermons, music, classes, weddings, funerals, session and committee meetings, or Biblical stories and verses that you heard or shared here? Take a particular experience (e.g., worship service, choir performance, mission activity, Sunday School class, women's connection, men's group, art session, or other small group) and explain what was special about that experience.

How have you experienced or encountered God, Jesus Christ, and the Holy Spirit at PCO? What have been the crucial elements of religious life that you have experienced here?

What have been your most memorable frustrations, pains, or sorrows associated with our church? What have been the influences of PCO in your life or the life of your family? What was it like to grow up as a child or youth in this church?

How has the church changed in your years here? What did the church look like and feel like in 1964? in 1979? in 1994? in 2009? in 2024? Compare life at PCO today with that of 10, 20, 30, 40, or 50 years ago.

How have <u>you</u> changed or grown in your experience in our church? What have you gained here? What have you lost?

What has been the "soul," or core of PCO as you have known it? What is different about the Presbyterian Church of Okemos?

If you were writing a history of PCO, what would it include from your years here? If you knew years ago what you know now, what would you have believed or done differently here at PCO?

What is your vision of this church and its people for the next 10-50 years?

Recall a funny story about life at PCO. Ask any other question that is just as valuable, revealing, or significant. Answer your question in writing.

At a cabin fever class on January 26, 2014, attendees learned about the clear continuities in this church: strong Biblical preaching, inspiring music, devotion to family, commitment to education, expanding mission, and increasing small groups. More specific details included Howard Kehde's leadership in starting this church, Ron Byars's visits to people on the very first day that they had attended our church, Larry Farris's establishing the Board of Deacons, Mark Ramsey's courage in hosting a talk by Rev. Jane Spahr, Jazz Sundays during Rob Carlson's ministry, and Alice Townley's conversation and contemplation classes.

This year, we are welcoming any new contributions that you consider pertinent. We will place samples of material collected in 2014 on the table in the church library. They will vary each Sunday in April: poems, letters, photographs, journal entries, reports about mission trips, and personal stories. You can include new kinds of examples.
