#### **Music Notes**

This morning we join the wider church community in mourning the passing of the beloved Presbyterian musician Hal H. Hopson. A prolific composer, Hopson published over 3,000 works spanning almost every form of sacred music. A church musician throughout his life, he served as a conductor and clinician for hymn festivals and workshops around the world and as a professor of church music at Westminster Choir College. Hopson had a special interest in congregational singing and made a significant contribution to the repertoire of hymn tunes, texts, responses, and psalm settings including 13 contributions to the 2013 Presbyterian *Glory to God* hymnal. Hopson's cantata "God with Us" was one of the few compositions selected by a panel at the Kennedy Center, Washington DC, to be placed in a capsule during the U.S. Bicentennial in 1976. It will be opened at the Tricentennial in 2076 and the cantata will be heard again as a representative piece of American choral composition of this century.

The prelude for this morning's service is a setting of Hopson's popular melody "Merle's Tune"named for the composer's oldest sister, his first piano teacher. Merle's Tune appears several times in the hymnal including the opening hymn How Lovely, Lord (Psalm 84). The two short responses "Restore in Us, O God" and "We Are Forgiven" are examples of Hopson's love for sung congregational responses. The closing hymn "The Gift of Love", a paraphrase of 1 Corinthians 13, is considered Hopson's best known hymn and is often heard as a solo or anthem arrangement. The postlude, a festive trumpet voluntary, is one of Hopson's many works for organ.
