Music Notes

It is ironic that Fanny Mendelssohn Hensel's family took her Piano Trio in d minor to the publishers Breitkopf and Härtel after her death for they had all but forbidden her to publish works while she was alive. Fanny was Felix Mendelssohn's older sister, the family's first-born child. She enjoyed the same musical education and upbringing as her brother. Like Felix, Fanny showed prodigious musical ability as a child both as a pianist and as a budding composer. However, the prevailing attitudes of the time toward women limited her opportunities. Her father warned her that while Felix could become a professional musician if he chose, she could not do so herself. Except for Felix, her entire family opposed her dreams of a career as a concert pianist or even as a composer. Ironically, Felix, as well as many others, considered her an even better pianist than he.

In 1829, after a courtship of several years, Fanny married the painter Wilhelm Hensel who, unlike her parents, encouraged her to compose. A few of her songs and small piano pieces began to receive public performances.

The B minor sonata, published in 1912 by Alexandre Béon with attribution to Jean-Baptiste Loeillet de Gant (1688-c.1720), was actually written by an entirely different member of the same Flemish musical dynasty, one also christened Jean-Baptiste Loeillet, but generally known as John. The piece was originally published in about 1725 as a trio sonata for flute, oboe, and basso continuo in C minor. Béon's contribution as an editor was extensive. Apart from misattributing the composer, he also changed the work's instrumentation and key, realized the continuo part in florid fashion for the piano, and provided all manner of expressive suggestions for the interpreters.
