
## Policy Report By Ellen Hoekstra

The most important thing to know about the state legislature right now is that policy makers have not approved the budget. This is particularly a problem for schools, whose budget years begin on July 1. It was very difficult for districts to plan staffing and other expenditures for this school year, exacerbated by what is happening at the federal level. One result is that Okemos will not be providing lunch free of charge for all students, and Williamston is considering a similar change.

PCO members may be asked to sign numerous petitions for 2026 ballot proposals. Petition circulators must obtain signatures 180 days prior to Election Day-- 446,198 for those to change the state constitution and 356,958 for those to amend state law. Please remember that state law doesn't require circulators to provide accurate descriptions proposals and that most circulators are paid by signature.

Here are some of the proposals at various stages of approval by the State Board of Canvassers:

- A proposal to create a new tax on wealthier individuals to increase public school funding. This constitutional proposal aims to raise \$1.5 billion through a tax of 5% on individuals earning more than \$500,000 and joint filers earning more than \$1 million.
- A constitutional proposal requiring the adoption of ranked choice voting, the use of paper ballots, and scheduling primaries at least 140 days before the general election.
- A statutory proposal to change the recent amendments to the minimum wage laws. The proposal would raise rates
  more slowly--\$14.97 by 2028 rather than \$15 by 2027. Significantly, it eliminates the lower minimum wage for
  tipped workers.
- AX MI Tax, a constitutional proposal to eliminate all property taxes and make it significantly more difficult to raise all other taxes. The proposal would require a 2/3 vote of the legislature and a 60% vote by local residents to raise taxes. This proposal failed to make it to the ballot in 2024.
- Committee to Protect Voters' Rights, a constitutional proposal to require proof of citizenship to vote. It would eliminate voters' current ability to use an affidavit rather than photo identification for in-person voting.
- American for Citizen Voting, another constitutional proposal to regulate voting by eliminating the ability to vote in
  person with an affidavit rather than photo identification. This proposal goes further by mandating that the Secretary
  of State verify voters' citizenship. It would require two separate voting lists, one for Michigan candidates and ballot
  proposals and one for federal candidates.



## **Men's Group Book Discussion**

The Men's Group will be discussing the book <u>The Road to Wisdom - On Truth, Science, Faith, and Trust</u> by Francis Collins starting in October. Francis Collins is a former director of the National Institute of Health and head of the Human Genome Project as well as being a Christian. Even if you are not a regular participant in the Men's Group, we'd love to have you join our discussion of this special book. Note that our discussions are every other week for four weeks.

*Poverty, by America* by Matthew Desmond (2 copies) "In this landmark book, acclaimed sociologist Matthew Desmond draws on history, research, and original reporting to show how affluent Americans knowingly and unknowingly keep poor people poor. Elegantly written and fiercely argued, this compassionate book gives us new ways of thinking about a morally urgent problem. It also helps us imagine solutions."


Toxic Charity: How Churches and Charities Hurt Those They Help (And How to Reverse It) by Robert D. Lupton "Veteran urban activist Robert Lupton reveals the shockingly toxic effects that modern charity has upon the very people meant to benefit from it. This groundbreaking work shows us how to start serving needy and impoverished members of our communities in a way that will lead to lasting, real-world change."

The Anti-Greed Gospel: Why the Love of Money Is the Root of Racism and How the Church Can Create a New Way Forward by Malcolm Foley "Black Christian historian Malcolm Foley shows how racism is part of a cycle of self-interest that begins in a lust for power and money and causes violence and exploitation. The church can break this cycle by building communities of deep economic solidarity, anti-violence, and truth telling."

Bone of the Bone: Essays of America by a Daughter of the Working Class by Sarah Smarsh "Sarah Smarsh brings her graceful storytelling and incisive critique to the challenges that define our times – class division, political fissures, gender inequality, environmental crisis, media bias, the rural-urban gulf."

In addition to these works of non-fiction, we added two new novels to our collection: *The Emperor of Gladness* by Ocean Vuong "Nineteen-year-old Hai stands on the edge of a bridge in pelting rain, ready to jump, when he hears someone shout across the river. The voice belongs to Grazina, an elderly widow succumbing to dementia, who convinces him to take another path. Over the course of the year, the unlikely pair develops a life-altering bond with the power to transform Hai's relationship to himself, his family, and a community on the brink."

Stone Yard Devotional by Charlotte Wood "Burnt out and in need of retreat, a middle-aged woman leaves Sydney to return to the place she grew up, taking refuge in a small religious community hidden away on the stark plains of rural Australia. A novel about forgiveness, grief, and what it means to be good."

## **BOOK NOOK**

On Her Game: Caitlin Clark and the Revolution in Women's Sports by Christine Brennan

Caitlin Clark came to Christine Brennan's attention late in the game. By the end of the Paris Olympics in August, 2024, however, the well-respected sports columnist was working on a book about the star player for the University of Iowa and Indiana Fever basketball teams. Clark, who "seemed to be 22 going on 40, or 50," had become "a groundbreaking, historic, immensely popular but also at times controversial cultural figure." The Women's National Basketball Association was highly "unprepared . . . for Clark's arrival."

"What was going on?" Brennan continues in her introduction to On Her Game. "Was this because Clark is white and straight in a league that is 74 percent Black or mixed-race, with a sizable gay population? Was it because she played at lowa rather than one of women's basket-ball's blue bloods? . . . . Was it because the WNBA did so little to help its players understand what was about to happen when Clark entered the league? Was it because of her eight-year, \$28 million Nike shoe deal . . . when established Black stars had never received that kind of a contract? Was it jealousy? Was it all of the above?" What promising and provocative questions to examine.





Brennan certainly captures the appeal and accomplishments of Clark, especially since 2022 at the University of Iowa. Especially striking are her first-year statistics, the all-time records in points scored and assists delivered that she set, her poise and maturity at handling interviews, and her accessibility, particularly to young girls who admired her. "No female athlete had ever had such a profound effect on attendance, social media, TV viewership, and merchandise sales on a sport and a league in so short a time."

Brennan is also very good at narrating certain moments in Clark's career. On February 26, 2023, two points behind the Indiana Hoosiers with 1.5 seconds to go, "Clark launched a wild shot from a ridiculous position, off-balance, left leg askew"—and made it, winning the game for the Hawkeyes. The Fever's 9-4 record in the second half of Clark's first professional league play is vivid and suspenseful. More important, when asked whether Connecticut Sun player DiJonai Carrington had deliberately hit her in the eye, trying to block a shot, Clark answered, "It wasn't intentional by any means. You just watch the play."

A sports reporter for 40 years, Brennan sets well historical contexts such as Title IX, the old guard's resistance to change, and the disparities between women and men's sports. Players, coaches, and WNBA officials damn themselves in their sexism, racism, jealousies, and lies. At first, as a pro, Clark faced severe difficulties, but Fever teammates were soon there for her with efforts like the De-escalation Committee.

Brennan's answer to the first six questions mentioned in the second paragraph above is her seventh question.



Does anything unify "all of the above"? Too many people, I believe, were threatened by the talents of Caitlin Clark. Too much success scares some people. The great irony, of course, is that so many people benefited from the exciting presence and accomplishments of this gifted, intelligent, driven, and game-changing young woman.

"Moving at breakneck speed" in composing <u>On Her Game</u>, however, has hampered Christine Brennan in certain ways. She pays little attention to Iowa coach Lisa Bluder, assistant coach Jan Jensen, and teammates other than Kate Martin. Certain questions remain. Why did Clark whine so much about referees' calls? What were the foundations of Caitlin's joy, court vision, and "enticing style of play?" What influence did Caitlin's mother and Clark's Catholic faith play in her sports and character? A broader analysis of Caitlin Clark as a person would help humanize her. As a young girl, she played the piano. Only one sentence on Clark as a <u>student</u>-athlete at Iowa (she was a marketing major with a 3.64 GPA) is a glaring omission. Giving an entire chapter to Brennan's two questions that she asked Carrington shifts the attention to Brennan, away from Clark.

I would love to be alive in 2035 and read a second edition of this book.
