
Facility and Congregation Stewardship

In order for our congregation to fulfill its mission, we must have a "place" from which to do our work. Our church building and property serve as this place, and our stewardship of these assets is essential to carry out our work. Our building and property provide identity and connection to our community. Our commitment to caring for creation is reflected in our 100 solar panel installation readily visible on our grounds along with our native plants at the parking lot entrance.

As we look to expand our community partnerships in support of our *Journey to 2030* vision, our facility can play a vital role. Our church building provides for worship, meetings, weddings, rehearsals, choir practice, Sunday school, memorials, study groups, fellowship, and special events. In addition, we share our facilities with several community groups in need of a place to meet and work.



2025 Operating Budget \$575,355



Worship & Music - \$168,525 (28%)

Facility & Congregation Stewardship - \$164677 (29%)

Community Engagement & Mission - \$85,637 (15%) Does not include designated mission giving and inkind donations. In 2024 these totaled \$28,216.

Congregation Care & Life - \$65,855 (11%)

Faith Formation - \$96,631 (17%)

Note that this budgeted amount included salary for an Associate Pastor for a full year. There have been some cost savings to 2025 budget, as this position remains vacant. The Pastor's and the Associate Pastor's salaries are distributed across the budget categories based on the job description.

Worship and Music

Worship and music are at heart of our life together at PCO! Sunday morning worship leadership is shared by our staff and members of the congregation, from the youngest to the most senior. Musical offerings from the Chancel Choir, Handbell Choir, and Youth Instrumental Choir inspire us. We hear the sound of love poured out as we confess our sins and receive the promise of the gospel at the baptismal font. We are fed the bread of life from the Table that welcomes all. Agape Meal, an intergenerational Christmas pageant, Jazz Sunday, glorious Easter music, Creation Care Sunday, Youth Sunday, and Play and Pray July were some of special Sunday services this past year.



Our music program blessed not just our congregation, but the whole community. A traditional Lessons and Carols service drew a large audience and raised funds for Advent House. Jazz Sunday was preceded by a Saturday night concert featuring Detroit-based trumpeter James O'Donnell. A Kaleidoscope Collage Concert featuring three handbell choirs amongst other musicians raised funds for the Food Pantry.

Congregational Care and Life

Much of the life of our congregation is about providing care for one another and those in the community. The Deacons and church members provide care; they organize and assist with weddings and memorials, as well as visit and prepare meals and offer communion for those who need comfort and help. This care extends to the community through meals to shelters/kitchens, and clothing for refugees. Church groups help members get involved both in the church activities and community efforts. The Artists Circle coordinates Liturgical Art; the Crafts Ministry provides prayer shawls giving comfort and hats keeping kids warm in the winter; while other groups, Life Stories, Women's Connection, Women's Dinner Out, Men's Group, and Retirees' Group provide both spiritual and social interaction.

Can I help provide care to members of the congregation or community? Can I make dinner for or visit someone going through a rough time, or can I make a larger dinner for those in a shelter? Can I join a group to get to know others in the congregation a little better, and maybe provide a shawl or a story along the way?

High School students gather on Tuesday afternoons for Homework & Hangout at a local café. Our Confirmation Class challenges the youth to "Change the World" as a disciple of Christ. Opportunities to deepen faith occur through overnight retreats, mission events, and multi-day youth conferences. Ask any of our youth about the impact of these programs and you will be moved by the depth of their experiences.



Adult education classes are offered each Sunday, featuring a variety of topics from theology to psychology, bible study to current events. Classes are taught by pastors, guest speakers and often by church members with special insight. There are several additional study group opportunities for members, specifically related to our faith formation; weekday Bible Study classes for adults and Conversation & Contemplation class, as well as more social groups that meet throughout the year. We celebrate our commitment to, and the impact of, a life-long practice of our discipleship.

Can I attend adult Christian education classes or a study group, or share my faith by leading a class? Can I share my faith with children and youth by teaching Sunday school or vacation bible school? Can I attend a mission project with the youth? The Worship and Music ministry at PCO feeds our body, minds, and souls each week. And as a people fed and blessed, we are sent out each week to feed others.



Can I spend Sunday morning once or twice a year to serve as a liturgist, as a greeter or as an usher? Can I join the chancel choir or the bell choir? Can I share special music during the summer months?
