Advent 2025: The Will to Dream

As we approach this Advent and Christmas season, many of us are experiencing a range of emotions. We are anticipating the joy of the holiday – the decorating and the cooking, the rituals and the gift-giving, the time with family and friends. And yet there is much in our lives and world which bring pain and despair, anger and frustration. We are longing for a world where hope, peace, joy and love reign.

This Advent season we will be sharing material from *The Will to Dream* by Illustrated Ministry. We will be rooted in prophetic imagination—a theological framework powerfully explored by the late theologian and biblical scholar Walter Brueggemann—in the sacred practice to see beyond what is and move toward what could be.

The authors of the material share: "In this time of upheaval, we find trust is fragile, truth contested, and spaces between us feel harder to cross. Divisions stretch far and wide. The constant churn of political tension leaves many feeling anxious and uncertain. Community feels strained, and connection is harder to come by. Hearts are weary, and souls unsettled, and people of all perspectives are searching—not just for answers, but for understanding, healing, and hope. This ache is not weakness; it is a holy longing—a sacred desire for a world made whole. From this longing comes the will to dream—a persistent courage to imagine, resist, and rebuild a better world." I invite you to join us in this holy longing as we seek a world made whole through the birth of the Word made flesh, Jesus Christ.

Throughout the Advent season there will be opportunities to dream for a world where Christ's love reigns. Sunday worship will feature texts and messages focused on the candles we light: hope, peace, joy and love, accompanied by special music. I will facilitate a Bible study during the education hour on the book of Isaiah, from which many of our traditional Advent scriptures of longing originate. In addition, I hope you will join us for:

- The soaring music and scripture of <u>An Evening of Lessons and Carols</u>, on Sunday, December 14 at 7:00 p.m. A free-will offering will be collected to support Advent House Ministries.
- A <u>Longest Night Service</u> on Wednesday, December 17 at 7:00 p.m. in the Chapel as we recognize the complicated emotions that accompany the holidays.
- <u>All-ages Christmas Pageant</u> on Sunday, December 21 during worship, where everyone can channel their dreams to be a shepherd or an angel or wisemen
- <u>Carols, Candlelight & Communion</u> a family Christmas Eve Service on December 24 at 5 pm. We will celebrate the birth of the Christ child with one service where all generations can share together the joy of the season.


Gas and Grocery Cards Available



Policy Report by Ellen Hoekstra

The Mission Committee had, of course, paid close attention to the federal shutdown on food assistance), given that last year our state's 1.4 million SNAP recipients received around \$3 billion in food assistance. Although the shutdown is over, its impact is not, with empty shelves in many pantries as SNAP recipients and federal employees dealt with the uncertainty of food for their families.

The federal shutdown also negatively affected childcare for low-income families, with 9 Head Start programs—mainly in northern Michigan—not receiving funding. One UP Head Start program had to close.

As reported previously, Michigan's K-12 students fall behind kids in other states in scores on reading exams, very likely linked to Michigan's absentee rate, one of the highest in the nation. One of four students misses 18 days of school a year. Absenteeism affects not only the pupils who are not in school but also their classmates because of the impact on teachers' lesson plans and the need to "catch up" those who have been absent. (Incidentally, school attendance is one of the metrics that Communities in Schools Michigan uses to measure student progress, with the other two being behavior and academics.)

Another challenge for schools is the underfunding of special education, resulting in Michigan having among the country's lowest graduation rates for students needing these services. A recent report recommends that Michigan increases special ed funding by 39%.

In addition to the increasing costs of health insurance, another current challenge in health care is access to medical care for transgender and nonbinary youth. Pressure from the federal government has resulted in two major hospital systems—University of Michigan and Corewell Health—dropping their services for these youth.

To end with somewhat positive news, \$131 million from the Opioid Healing and Recovery Account will increase access to support treatment and prevention services. This special funding, as you may recall, comes from a settlement out of litigation against certain pharmaceutical companies.

Food Bank / Food Pantry—What's the Difference?

The words "food bank" and "food pantry" are not synonymous. If we compare them to grocery stores, Michigan's seven regional food banks are similar to wholesalers. They provide food to food pantries, which are similar to retail grocery stores. Food banks, because of their size and their roles, are able to provide substantially more food that food pantries could otherwise purchase for their hungry customers.

The food bank that serves our region is the Greater Lansing Food Bank (GLFB), and it serves food pantries in seven counties: Clare, Isabella, Gratiot, Clinton, Shiawassee, Eaton, and Ingham. Some of the state's other food banks serve far larger geographic areas.

PCO's Mission Committee usually focuses on three nearby pantries that are part of the GLFB: the Okemos Community Food Pantry, the Haslett Food Pantry, and the Food Pantry of First Presbyterian Church of Lansing. These are the pantries to which food from the shopping cart and food raised during our AGAPE celebration is delivered.

When PCO makes a financial contribution to the GLFB, we ask for it to be shared among these three GLFB pantries near where most PCO members live.

BOOK NOOK

For the Time Being

by Annie Dillard

"I am no scientist. I am a wanderer with a background in theology and a penchant for quirky facts." Annie Dillard wrote those words about <u>Pilgrim at Tinker Creek</u>, which won a Pulitzer Prize 50 years ago. They are also true of her book, <u>For the Time Being</u>, published in 1999. It continued the excellence, variety, originality, daring, and wonder of all her work.

The author's introductory note is unusual but enticing. "This is a nonfiction first-person narrative, but it is not intimate, and its narratives keep breaking. Its form is unusual, its scenes are remote, its focus wide, and its tone austere. Its pleasures are almost purely mental." The subjects are diverse, appearing and reappearing in each chapter.

Each chapter contains ten subheadings: birth, sand, China, clouds, numbers, Israel, encounters, thinker, evil, and now. The French paleontologist, Pierre Teilhard de Chardin, and Rabbi Israel ben Eliezer, the Baal Shem Tov, "dominate the thinking about an individual's place in the buried generations of humans, and in eternity." When I started the book, I did not think that Dillard could pull together such disparate subjects. I was wrong. There are three reasons why this approach works—and works so well.

Some of the parts are so engrossing and the facts so telling that they could exist on their own. The accounts of life in an obstetrical ward—the treatment of newborns almost like an assembly line—sit beside the haunting descriptions of birth defects such as bird-headed dwarfs. Seven thousand terra-cotta soldiers buried under planted fields near Xi'an, China, are

exposed like swimmers when archeologists dig trenches in the fields. The torture of Rabbi Akiva ben Joseph by scraping away his skin and muscles to the bone is excruciating. The restrained love letters of Teilhard, a Jesuit priest, and Lucile Swan, an American sculptor, are poignant. One account of the creation of the world, in which the divine spark went awry, makes the origin of evil charming.

Some of the parts are interchangeable, and many of them fit integrally together. The biographical vignettes of Teilhard de Chardin fit under "China" (he discovered Peking man), "sand" (he worked in the Gobi Desert), "thinker" (when he did not have elements of the Eucharist, at sunrise he would "divinize the new day") and "evil" (life is to be "charged with the divine influence"). The vignettes of the Baal Shem Tov lead to hallowed ground in Bethlehem, strange encounters in Israel, and meditations about mortality and immortality. Even the photograph covering the front and back of the hard-cover book, <u>Camels Crossing Dunes at Tsagan</u>, Outer Mongolia, 1925, by J. B. Shackelford, pulls several themes wonderfully together.

Most of the parts lead to larger questions. Annie Dillard's mind is curious, observant, and absorbent, enlightening, evocative, even exhilarating. But it is also probing and profound. This book will make you think. Several questions run through the book. Why are there birth defects? Does God cause natural calamities? "If God does not cause everything that happens, does God cause anything that happens?" Where does evil come from? Who are we as people? Why were we born? How does an individual matter in this immense world? What is our place in the scheme of things? How should human beings live? "Why is there something here, instead of nothing? And why are we aware of this question?"

These questions, plus the disparate parts and the threads interwoven together, point to a world that is complex, paradoxical, inviting, and incomplete. "Plunge into matter," Teilhard said, "plunge into God." According to Hasids, a person "who struggles long to pray and study Torah will be able to discover the sparks of divine light in all of creation, in each solitary bush and grain and woman and man. And when he cleaves strenuously to God for many years, he will be able to release the sparks, to unwrap and lift these particular shreds of holiness, and return them to God. This is the human task: to direct and channel the sparks' re

turn. This task is 'tikun,' restoration."

For the time being, I will read more of Annie Dillard's and Teilhard de Chardin's books.
