Now may you be committed to the Lord our God with all your heart by following God's laws and observing God's commands, just as you are doing right now. – 1 Kings 8:61-63 (CEB)

Right now, the school is responding to a financial challenge. A regional drought destroyed all of their maize crops, used to help feed the girls and the dairy cows kept to provide milk for students.

Joyful, Anyway by Kate Bowler “Experiencing joy does not depend on everything getting better. Drawing on a decade of living with serious illness and a lifetime studying America’s obsession with progress, Kate Bowler shows why people so busy chasing happiness miss out on actual joy.”

When Church Stops Working: A Future for Your Congregation beyond More Money, Programs, and Innovation by Andrew Root and Blair D. Bertrand “What if the solution for the decline of today’s church isn’t more money, people, programs, innovation, or busyness? Using clear steps and practices, the authors invite church leaders to stop the endless cycle of doing more and rather to simply ‘be’ in God’s presence.”

Reading the Bible on Turtle Island: An Invitation to North American Indigenous Interpretation by T. Christopher Hoklotubbe and H. Daniel Zacharias “The authors delve deeply not only into the stories of Scripture but into the stories of Indigenous communities, including the complicated colonial history in North America. This book offers us a fresh reading of Scripture that celebrates the assets, blessings, and insights of Indigenous interpretation that speak invaluable lessons to all of God’s people.”

Dear Marty, We Crapped in Our Nest: Notes from the Edge of the World by Art Cullen “This is the right book at the right time. We have fouled our nest over the past half century in a way that was almost unavoidable, given our history of seeking domination – first over the Indigenous people of the Western World, then over their land. We simply cannot go on like this, washing our soil down the river while the planet bakes, ignoring our own immigration story.”

Art is How God Loves Us: The Sacred Beauty of Created Things by Meredith Hite Estevez “A radiant exploration of art as a spiritual gateway. Estevez beautifully illustrates how a spiritual perspective on art guides us toward our Creator and our most authentic selves.”

Wonder: 52 Conversations to Help Kids Fall in Love with Scripture by Meredith Miller “Instead of simply presenting Bible stories as a children’s Bible would, this book actually equips grown-ups to talk about the stories with children. Each story is accompanied by historical, literary, and cultural background.”

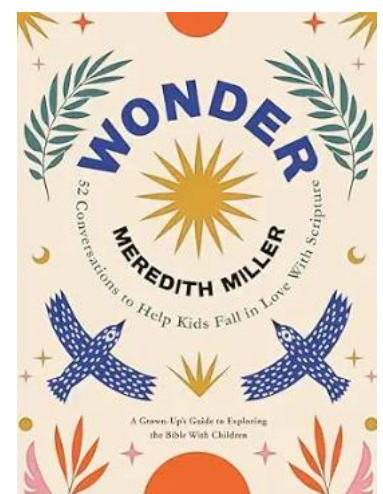
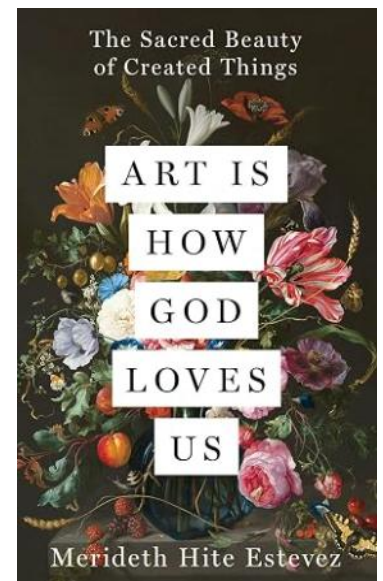
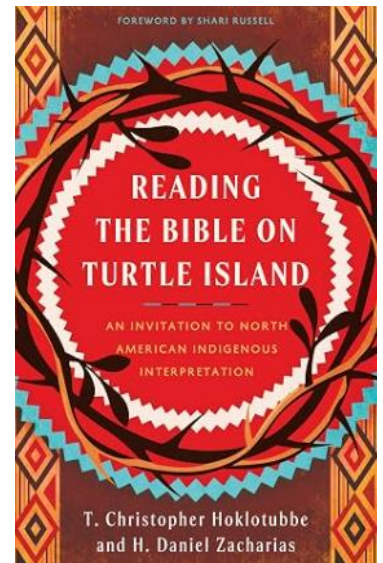
American Idolatry: How Christian Nationalism Betrays the Gospel and Threatens the Church by Andrew L. Whitehead “Reveals the theological and spiritual costs of Christian nationalism for the American church. It also illuminates expressions of Christianity that confront Christian nationalism and offer a faithful path forward.”

Shadows of the Republic: The Rebirth of Fascism in America and How to Defeat It for Good by Omer Aziz “What is driving the rise of fascism – and how can we stop it? With astringent clarity, Aziz traces the flaring up of fascist ideas in both American history and our current moment.”

Antisemitism: An American Tradition by Pamela S. Nadell “At a time when prejudice, discrimination, and hate against Jews is flaring across the country, this momentous work reveals how antisemitism – and resistance to that hatred – endures, representing not a rupture from America’s history, but a centuries-old legacy.”

Book Nook

With September comes schooling—in primary, secondary, and higher education. Because of its tone, coverage, composition, and photographs, Common Bonds, by Andrea Hinding, is one of the finest books about university education that I have ever read. It is brief, bountiful, and beautiful—a model for universities to emulate.

The tone of the author and the book is unusual. It is elevated, endearing, and people-centered. Hinding goes beyond the usual cheerleading, carping, and emphasis on sports that often take place at a university. She has stressed the enduring connections, the common bonds: the love of learning, the advancing of knowledge that makes a difference, the transmitting of a heritage that lasts long after a person has left the university. A university at its best does include a sense of integrity and fidelity, of work well-done, of love's labor lost and not lost, among people well-known and little-known. According to Rutherford Aris, a professor of chemistry, in a university "there should live on a sense of the unity of knowledge and of the juice and joy of its continued discovery and refreshment."

At the same time, Hinding is aware of the tensions and shortcomings of university education. Yes, college experiences can change, enlarging and elevating the individual and the group, surpassing expectations, binding together in adversity. But university experiences can also limit and disappoint and fail both in aims and results. "Acknowledging failure, limitation, and terrible loss," Andrea Hinding reminds us, makes history more accurate and human beings more humane and complete. In her book, the haunting picture of John Berryman reminds us not only of the brilliant poet reading his poems but also his jumping off the bridge over the Mississippi River to his death in 1972.

Hinding sets the scene well, by considering the university not only as a physical place but also as a land-grant college, a state university, and "a place of memory." Titles of the 12 chapters reveal the range and outlook. The chapters are (1) Wellsprings of the University, (2) Teaching and Learning, (3) Seeking Knowledge and Understanding, (4) Extensions, (5) Preserving Heritage, (6) Backbone of the University, (7) Student Lives, (8) Physical Education, (9) Rules and Rituals, (10) Great Performances, (11) Discontinuities, and (12) The Soul of a University. A brief introduction precedes nine to 34 photographs in each chapter. (Contrast the 16 pages given to "Physical Education" here with the three pages given to "Academic Success: A Way of Life" and 58 pages given to "Spartan Sports Success" in the beautifully colored history, The Spirit of Michigan State, published by J. Bruce McCristal in 2004.)

In each of the 12 chapters, black and white photographs often support what the author writes in her introductions. Chapter six, for instance, focuses on workers and staff members. George Yerkes was a janitor at Old Main who was "a friend of every student." He is typical of people who "shovel coal, fix broken water pipes, answer reference questions, write software programs, keep accounts, and greet visitors to our campuses." They are people who make the university run but often don't get the credit they deserve. "No Palm without the Dust of Labor," the motto for the class of 1912, captures this emphasis on the working class.

The chapter, "Extensions," takes us to four branches of the state university in Crookston, Duluth, Morris, and Waseca, Minnesota, and to a children's book fair in Bologna, Italy, in 1985. And chapter seven, "Student Lives," combines the curricular and extracurricular activities of students with the constants of being a student at college: "being young," trying to find one's place in the world, and "trying to find a way to make a living and a life." The attention paid to youth, women, native Americans, and Afro-Americans in this book is exemplary.

Andrea Hinding was an archivist, celebrated editor of Women's History Sources, and author of Proud History: A History of Pictures of the Y. M. C. A. in the United States. The subtitle of Common Bonds is A Memoir in Photographs of the University of Minnesota. Like "the soul of a university," the book is a work of great "commitment, integrity, courage, generosity, and imagination."



Author and archivist Andrea Hinding is also a historian. She served as the curator of the University of Minnesota Elmar L. Anderson Library and was elected a fellow of the Society of American Archivists in 1977



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
